A Covid Opportunity for Some - Rev. Curt Karns

 ¹¹I am longing to see you so that I may share with you some spiritual gift to strengthen you—
¹² or rather so that we may be mutually encouraged by each other's faith, both yours and mine. Romans 1:11-12

John Wesley famously suggested that Christians should earn all they can, in order to save all they can, in order to give all they can. Wesley, himself, followed that rubric, donating large sums throughout life, while choosing to live frugally. This may be a particularly good moment to remember such guidance.

The economic fallout from the pandemic has more and more people facing severe food insecurity. For some, however, the federal stimulus funds that we have been receiving may provide an opportunity to provide help.

Because of the economic difficulties so many face, this opportunity is not for everyone. For me, however, and for others like me, the stimulus money adds to my income at a time when I am not facing a reduction in salary or benefits. If this statement fits your situation as well, then I invite you to join me in supporting others facing COVID-related needs.

What I am suggesting is that we do two things. First, discover the needs near you and ask your church to collect donations to help, donating your own stimulus funds or, depending on your ability to give, a portion of those funds for that purpose. Second, write to the presbytery office to tell us what you and your church are doing to help. If we get a number of responses, we will publish them in future newsletters. It may well be that hearing from you will enlighten others to needs they do not know much about.

So, to kick this off, this is what I am doing with the stimulus funds I received last month. I received \$600 and am able to give all of it. I have been dismayed at the huge persistent food needs the pandemic has created. I am therefore giving it as follows;

 25% (\$150) to the <u>Presbyterian Hunger Program (PHP)</u>.
75% (\$450) to <u>The Presbytery of Yukon COVID Relief Grants</u> <u>Fund</u>, asking them to use at least 2/3 for hunger relief (which might mean going to <u>The Food Bank of Alaska</u>).

If you or your church sends money to the Presbytery for COVID relief, be sure to send a note (or email to <u>office@pbyukon.org</u>) letting us know that is how you wish your donation used.)

If you are one of the very many who cannot give in this way, I hope this

does not create any guilty feelings. This article is intended to be an encouragement to those who can, not a burden for those already struggling.

I wish you well in your own efforts to serve the gospel of Jesus Christ.

At their February 9 meeting, the presbytery Leadership Team expressed gratitude to both of them for their service, not only at New Hope Church, but also in other roles in the presbytery. Rev. Curt Matz served on the Ministry Commission and as a part of an Administrative Commission supporting the Korean Presbyterian Church of Fairbanks. Darlene Matz served on the Committee on Ministry and as moderator of the Kaktovik Presbyterian Church.

Since February 28th is the last day at New Hope Church for Curt and Darlene, New Hope Church will not be participating in the presbytery-wide worship service to be held online that day. Instead, the church has planned a special worship service to say good-bye.

The Matz came to us on loan from the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America and served as welcome partners in our common service to Jesus Christ. They have children and grandchildren in Fairbanks and will retire there. We wish them Godspeed.

Sunday School at Home

An ongoing challenge through the ages has been to find effective ways to help children come to faith and to grow as disciples of Jesus Christ. In these days when in-person Sunday School has not been practical, a number of you have found innovative ways to get good materials into parents' hands, asking parents to help their children to know Jesus and to follow Jesus' way.

One of the challenges in these COVID times, of course, is in getting the word out about resources our churches are making available. Newsletters are useful, but church leaders often wonder how many people are consistent in really reading their newsletters. Some people are more likely to check out a digital worship service than a digital newsletter.

With that in mind, one of our churches has found a great way to take advantage of worship time. Jewel Lake Parish helps parents by producing an online Sunday School featuring a Bible Story told for kids and posting it to YouTube. To help parents (and kids) find it, they put a link in the chat column during their online worship service. Parents can simply copy the link right then, while they are seeing it during the worship service, and then use it at a time of their choosing.

Although such ideas seem simple, they are also essential. This is a time when we must be innovative in our approach to all aspects of ministry, including Sunday School. Please be sure to share what you are doing at your church, too. Hearing from you is an encouragement and inspiration to us all.
