From Rev. Curt Karns:

Make me to know your ways, O Lord; teach me your paths. Lead me in your truth, and teach me, for you are the God of my salvation...Good and upright is the Lord;therefore he instructs sinners in the way. (Psalm 25:1-5, 8)

Psalm 25 is one example of a teaching we see throughout the Bible. God meets us where we are, and teaches God's way for us. Today, we find ourselves in the unusual situation of a world pandemic. We dare not miss the opportunity to spend time praying and reflecting on how God is molding us for this time and for the future.

One of the things I am learning is how important it is to connect with others. Not only do I need to enjoy the fellowship through the audio and video calls we are all making-after all isolation is always dangerous to our emotional wellbeing, even if social distancing is a part of loving our neighbor these days-I also need to hear from my brothers and sisters in faith in order to gain a wider perspective from them on what God is doing. Two Churches Joining for Sunday Online Worship

All of our churches across the presbytery are doing worship in new ways. Since we can't physically gather to worship God, most of our churches are finding ways to provide virtual gatherings, either on their church's page using Facebook Live, or using Zoom.

Two churches, however, have joined their resources. Last Sunday, Kuukpik Presbyterian Church in Nuiqsut began hosting a weekly Zoom worship service. However, the leaders from Gambell Presbyterian Church asked to join with them when they learned that Kuukpik was also linking the presbytery's toll-free conference call number into that service. The toll-free number is important for people, who do not have internet but want to join by phone without paying a long-distance phone charge.

The residents of Gambell fall into this latter category. According to Pastor Beulah Nowpakahok, her parishioners generally do not have access to internet, and therefore want to join in a service that uses the presbytery's toll-free phone number. "Besides," she commented, "it gives us the opportunity to hear from others in our presbytery, and that is a good thing."

The worship services for the Kuukpik Presbyterian/Gambell Presbyterian churches are at 11:00 a.m. every Sunday. The pastors are taking turns leading worship. Virginia Kasak is the commissioned pastor for Kuukpik Presbyterian in Nuiqsut. Beulah Nowpakahok and Merle Apassingok are the commissioned pastors for Gambell Presbyterian.

New Planning Underway for General Assembly

A final decision on the 224th General Assembly (2020) is still a week away, but the Committee on the Office of the General Assembly (COGA) spent a bulk of its second day in a virtual meeting, looking at critical business to be considered.

COGA is considering a shorter, two-day virtual assembly that would restrict

the amount of business brought before commissioners. Stay tuned!


Wednesday Evening Prayer Service

<u>Churches from the Presbytery of Yukon Support Mass Shelter for</u> <u>Homeless during Covid Crisis</u>

The Municipality of Anchorage partnered with the Brother Francis Sh elter to turn the Sullivan and Dempsey arenas into mass shelter's for the homeless during the Covid-19 crisis. First Presbyterian Church of Anchorage and Eagle River Presbyterian Church, combined with emergency grants from the Presbytery of Yukon, provided large-screen televisions for the arenas. The televisions serve two purposes. They allow the projection of classes for residents of the shelter and they provide entertainment options to break up the boredom of sitting in a shelter.



Sewing Masks and Making Kits for Those in Need

University Community Presbyterian Church members sewed masks and put together hygiene kits of essential items. These were then picked up and distributed by the Fairbanks Community Food Bank to those in need in the community.




Drive-In Food Bank in Utqiagvik

Though Utqiagvik is a small town, Utqiagvik Presbyterian Church now feeds 500 people monthly through its community Food Bank ministry. Adjusting to the situation during the Covid-19 pandemic, it has become a drive-up food bank with curbside service. This past week 1008 people were served, mostly elders, women and children, representing nearly 25% of Utqiagvik's 4257 population!




Addressing Children's Concerns during the Pandemic
