Locally, we participate in:

- Our Sunday school has organized clothes sortings for "turn-A-leaf" Thrift Store (Valley Charities, Inc.) The proceeds from this store go back into the community. There is a free medical equipment loan program as well as vouchers for items in the store for those who find themselves in a tough situation.
- Our church is one of eight member congregations in the Mat-Su PLUME Outreach. We are reaching out to places in our valley that don't have Christian ministries available.
- Our church also collects cans of food for our local food bank.
- Our church also administers a Safety Net Assistant Grant from

United Way that helps families with food, shelter and rent assistance.

Internationally we participate in:

One Great Hour of Sharing, Presbyterian Women offerings, and the American Leprosy Missions.


In our Presbytery:

Several from our church, along with those from First Presbyterian Church, Wasilla, went on a joint mission trip during the summer to work on the church building and provide Vacation Bible School. Our Sunday school collected food to send out there, as well as socks and underwear for the church to distribute.



Olgonik Presbyterian Church, Wainwright

These are days of excitement for the Olgonik Presbyterian Church in Wainwright, Alaska. On May 5th, the Rev. Jack Cormack agreed to move to the arctic to serve as Teaching Elder for three congregations, the Olgonik Presbyterian Church, The Atqasuk Chapel, and Kuukpik Presbyterian Church in Nuiqsut. The folks in Olgonik are especially happy about this as we have not had an ordained minister as a regular part of



our ministry team for 20 years.



Preparations are under way to receive Rev. Cormack (shown left) sometime in early July.

This shared pastor position is different than that experienced by most PCUSA churches. The pastor will only be in each of the three villages for one month out of three. Rev. Cormack's main job will be to train, coach and mentor local leaders, who will provide the consistent leadership for the church community. Please pray for our congregations and for Rev. Cormack as this new ministry begins.

The Olgonik Presbyterian Church is also grateful for the support the presbytery has been offering in other ways. Presbytery Executive Curt Karns visited our congregation in March, and we are grateful for his visit. The Rev. Ian MacInnes-Green provided leadership through Holy Week, culminating in a great number of baptisms on Easter Sunday. We enjoyed his time, his worship leadership and his humor.
